

## EMMANUEL VILLAUME MUSIC DIRECTOR & CHIEF CONDUCTOR PKF-PRAGUE PHILHARMONIA

The 2022/2023 season of PKF — Prague Philharmonia will provide our beloved audience with its usual balance of classical, romantic and contemporary repertoire in the same interpretative tradition of detailed chamber music spirit that characterizes the contagious and passionate music making of our ensemble. It will see the return of some of our favorite colleagues as well as the first appearance of others that we are very proud to present to you. Its main theme will revolve around Johannes Brahms and the composers that have influenced him, as well as those influenced by him.

Austrian artist Florian Krumpöck will play and conduct Mozart's *Piano Concerto No. 24* and Brahms's *First Symphony*. Antonín Dvořák benefited greatly from Brahms's help and guidance; I will have the pleasure to lead Dvořák's *Ninth Symphony* in a concert featuring Martinů's *Second Cello Concerto* with Lukáš Pospíšil. I will conduct Robert Schumann's *"Rhenish" Symphony* in a concert featuring extraordinary mezzo-soprano Oleysa Petrova and Brahms's *Fourth Symphony* for our closing concert where virtuoso harpist Emmanuel Ceysson will perform a concerto by Carl Reinecke, a composer who premiered as a conductor several of Brahms's works. Another Prague favorite, Garrick Ohlsson, will play with me Brahms's behemoth *Second Piano Concerto*. While we welcome back to our stage acclaimed pianist Simon Trpčeski, we will introduce violinist Grace Park for the first time in Prague to our audience, and internationally recognized conductors Marc Minkowsky and Domingo Hindoyan will make their debut with us.

It is a particular pleasure to have our friend star soprano Ailyn Pérez in a concert centered around the theme of "orientalism", from Mozart to Massenet, to open a formidable season. I cannot believe it will be my eighth one at the head of this very special institution. It has been an honor to grow as an artist and as a human being surrounded by all of you, on stage and in the hall. Enjoy!

Dear friends of the PKF — Prague Philharmonia, ladies and gentlemen,

I am honoured to have the opportunity to address you once again as Chairman of the Board of the PKF — Prague Philharmonia. However, I must admit that when I was considering what to write, I found myself hesitating for the first time in years. In 'pre-Covid' days I would reflect on the position of the orchestra, its finances, its standing on the international stage and its mission. At the start of the 'Covid' period I had to be the bearer of bad news, whether it was the cancellation of concerts and tours or the state of the orchestra's budget. During the 'Covid' period I responded with hope and, as the situation changed, even optimism. However, things always turned out differently. I therefore hope that we can meet up this season in good health and without any further restrictions at our concerts and enjoy the musical experiences prepared for us by the management of the orchestra together with the Music Director and Chief Conductor Emmanuel Villaume. I wish the orchestra a successful and uninterrupted season.

Dear ladies and gentlemen, friends of the PKF — Prague Philharmonia,


On behalf of the City of Prague, please allow me to extend my heartfelt greetings at the start of a new concert season. Despite all of our hopes, in recent months we have unfortunately been unable to escape the impact of the pandemic and the related restrictions on our lives. That makes me all the more appreciative of the fact that the PKF — Prague Philharmonia has managed to break the silence. It has shown that even in these hard times it is possible to adhere to the rules and at the same time offer people culture again, bringing them some much-needed joy and distraction.

One example of this was the concert in December where the PKF — Prague Philharmonia was joined in the Smetana Hall of the Municipal House by perhaps the most famous couple in opera today. The Czech audience had to endure two changes of date before they finally got to enjoy the concert by Russian-born Anna Netrebko and her husband, the Azerbaijani tenor Yusif Eyvazov, though the reaction to the performance was all the more tumultuous and enthusiastic for the long wait.

In the autumn, special permission from the Japanese government meant the orchestra was able to represent Prague and the whole of the Czech Republic in the Land of the Rising Sun, for which it is owed a debt of thanks. In the time of coronavirus, the presence of a foreign orchestra in Japan was something of a rarity, which made the tour all the more unforgettable.

I also appreciate the fact that in recent months the ensemble has not forgotten about those fans who, for one reason or another, prefer recorded music to live concerts. At the end of 2021, the orchestra brought out an album with music by the Czech greats Antonín Dvořák and Bohuslav Martinů, which, like previous albums, is also available via streaming services.

Despite the fact that the PKF — Prague Philharmonia is one of our youngest orchestras, I am convinced that it has solid foundations on which to build. I am looking forward to what the new season will bring, and I wish the management, musicians and other staff all the best. I trust that they will find plenty of inspiration and courage, and that audiences will again enjoy cultural events of the highest quality.





### PKF-PRAGUE PHILHARMONIA

Jiří Bělohlávek (1946—2017) Honorary Founder of the PKF—Prague Philharmonia



In 1994, the world-famous conductor Jiří Bělohlávek together with a group of talented young musicians founded the Prague Chamber Philharmonic Orchestra, which has been active to this day; since its 20<sup>th</sup> season under the name PKF — Prague Philharmonia. Over the 28 years of its existence, this orchestra has gained respect throughout the music world. It is appreciated for its characteristic sound as well as for the focus of its repertoire, including, but not limited to, the music by Joseph Haydn, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and Ludwig van Beethoven.

The PKF — Prague Philharmonia has played with a number of internationally acclaimed conductors and soloists, such as Jakub Hrůša, Julian Rachlin, Martha Argerich, Jefim Bronfman, András Schiff, Gil Shaham, Isabelle Faust, Emmanuel Pahud, Luciano Pavarotti, Diana Damrau, Anna Netrebko, Plácido Domingo, Gautier Capuçon, Maxim Vengerov, Mischa Maisky, Juan Diego Flórez, Jonas Kaufmann and many others.

The orchestra is regularly invited to international music festivals (BBC Proms, Dresdner Musikfestspiele, MITO Settembre Musica, Pražské jaro) and gives concerts at top world venues (Berliner Philharmonie, Elbphilharmonie Hamburg, Gasteig Munich, Tokyo Suntory Hall, Royal Opera House Muscat in Oman, Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad Cultural Centre in Kuwait, Festspiel Baden-Baden, Seoul Arts Center, Musikverein, Théâtre Champs-Elysées, among others). The PKF - Prague Philharmonia has recorded over 90 CDs, released by leading Czech and international music publishers (Deutsche Grammophon, Warner Classics, Sony Classical, Decca, EMI, Harmonia Mundi and Supraphon). Its recordings have garnered numerous prizes: the Gold Record RAC Canada in 2000, Harmonie Award in 2001 and Diapason d'Or in 2007. The CD Héroïque with Bryan Hymel was nominated for the International Opera Award in 2016 and the CD Bohemian Rhapsody with Gábor Boldoczki was nominated for the International Classical Music Award (ICMA) in 2017. The Ravel, Debussy & Bizet CD received excellent reviews from the London Sunday Times, Gramophone and the BBC Music Magazine, which included it in its top ten recordings of the week; the CD with the acclaimed tenor Benjamin Bernheim for Deutsche Grammophon from November 2019 won Opus Klassik Award and numerous accolades in international press (Diapason d'Or, Choc de Classica, among others).


The orchestra has been led by the French conductor Emmanuel Villaume since the 2015/2016 season.

The Music Director and Chief Conductor of the PKF — Prague Philharmonia, Emmanuel Villaume, continues his tenure this season also as the Music Director of The Dallas Opera.

A frequent collaborator with major international opera houses, Emmanuel leads performances at The Metropolitan Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Washington National Opera, San Francisco Opera, Los Angeles Opera, Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, Santa Fe Opera, Royal Opera House Covent Garden, Liceu Barcelona, Montreal Opera, Teatro Colón, Opéra de Paris, Théâtre du Capitole de Toulouse, Bayerische Staatsoper, Deutsche Oper Berlin, Hamburgische Staatsoper, Cologne Opera, Teatro La Fenice, Teatro Regio di Torino and Teatro Real Madrid. Also leading a distinguished career on the international symphonic platform, Emmanuel collaborates with esteemed ensembles such as Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra, San Francisco Symphony, Boston Symphony Orchestra, Montreal Symphony Orchestra, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Orchestre de Paris, Danish National Symphony Orchestra, Münchner Rundfunkorchester, Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Melbourne Symphony Orchestra and NHK Tokyo.

Villaume studied at the Conservatoire de Strasbourg and at Sorbonne University in Paris (literature, philosophy, music) and holds an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Indianapolis.






# ORCHESTRAL SERIES A

AD-VENTURES INVEST ALONGSIDE NEXT GENERATION

PARTNER OF THE ORCHESTRAL SERIES



For this year's orchestral subscription series A, the PKF-Prague Philharmonia is offering nine concerts with a programme which includes music from the Classical period to the 20<sup>th</sup> century. A central figure in our repertory will be Johannes Brahms, one of the most important composers of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, who had a significant influence on the career of Antonín Dvořák. The PKF-Prague Philharmonia will perform works by composers whose music is part of the orchestra's core repertoire (Mozart, Beethoven, Mendelssohn), as well compositions by those who appear more sporadically in the concert series programmes, such as the Czech composer Viktor Kalabis. For four of these concerts the orchestra will be led by Chief Conductor Emmanuel Villaume, while for the remainder

the baton will be transferred to the respected French conductor **Marc Minkowski** and Venezuelan-born **Domingo Hindoyan**. Star names also feature amongst the soloists: the opening concert will feature a soloist from the Metropolitan Opera in New York, **Ailyn Peréz**, while in April we will be welcoming the Grammy Award-winning pianist **Garrick Ohlsson**. CZK 1 300 | 900 | 700 | 500 (SL/E\*) | CZK 200 (ST\*) \*SL/E partial view and organ gallery above the stage \*ST standing We open our 29th concert season with music by three French composers, bookended by famous works by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. We will discover a number of connections between the compositions from the first evening of the orchestral series. One of these is a fondness for exotic subjects: the works we will hear are linked to Egypt, Turkey and even the Far East. A substantial part of the programme will also be dedicated to opera, where we will hear numbers from three operas by composers who each found their own way to this genre. First off will be Mozart's The Abduction from the Seraglio, specifically the sparkling, energetic overture to this comic opera. Massenet's Thais represents a completely different form of lyrical opera and still remains one of the most popular of the composer's thirty works in this genre. The opera section of the programme also features the Bacchanal from the opera Samson and Delilah, whose composer, Camille Saint-Saëns, was following the trends in spectacular French grand opera. We will then stay with vocal-instrumental music with the song cycle Shéhérezade by the French impressionist Maurice Ravel. The composer was very taken by this subject, inspiring him to write two compositions about it. The song cycle is full of references to music from Arabian countries, India, and even China. We will be guided through this colourful work by the star soprano Ailyn Pérez, a regular guest at the most prestigious opera houses, including the Metropolitan Opera in New York.

"My musical creed is in the key of E-flat Major and contains three Bs in its key signature: Bach, Beethoven and Brahms!" This was how the iconic conductor Hans von Bülow summed up his musical preferences at the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. And he went even further: in 1880 he described Bach as the father. Beethoven as the son and Brahms as the Holy Spirit of classical music. It was indeed Bülow who added Johannes Brahms to this trio - perhaps he already had an inkling of the attention Brahms's music would receive even decades after his death. We will be focusing on the youngest of the seminal 'Bs' during this season as Johannes Brahms occupies a fascinating position in the history of music. As an exponent of the Classical-Romantic synthesis, he drew from the tradition of the classics and incorporated new (for example, expressive) techniques. He thus followed on from Beethoven while at the same time standing in opposition to Richard Wagner and his followers, and inspiring and supporting a number of other great talents, including Antonín Dvořák. His Symphony No. 1 in C minor is also a direct expression of Brahms's admiration of Beethoven. He spent several years composing it, paralysed by the idea that Beethoven was unsurpassable in the genre of symphony. Florian Krumpöck will appear here in a dual role - as conductor as well as the soloist in Mozart's captivating Concerto for Piano and Orchestra in C minor, whose solo part Mozart wrote for himself.

However, only one of the compositions which you will hear this evening was written in the Czech lands, and then under tragic circumstances. It was composed by Pavel Haas, a pupil of Leoš Janáček, in 1943 when he was a prisoner at the concentration camp in Terezín. Unfortunately, his story did not have a happy ending and a year after writing the composition Pavel Haas died in Auschwitz. Then only two years later, though under totally different circumstances, Bohuslav Martinů wrote his Concerto for Cello and Orchestra No. 2. He composed this charming, melodic work in the USA when he knew that the Second World War was finally over. The USA was also the setting for Dvořák's Symphony No. 9 in D minor "From the New World". Dvořák created his most famous symphony while working at the New York Conservatory. Incidentally, a great future was predicted for Dvořák by a loyal friend of his in later years, Johannes Brahms, whose work is one of this season's focal points. It was Brahms who recommended Dvořák to his own publisher Simrock, stating that he would be glad if "he could invent even one main theme which Dvořák appears to casually trot out". The programme of works by our national composers will be performed by interpreters who can be considered locals: the Chief Conductor of the orchestra. Emmanuel Villaume, and the PKF - Prague Philharmonia's cello concert master Lukáš Pospíšil.

Viktor Kalabis was one of the most outstanding figures of the Czech music scene in the second half of the 20th century. He was influenced by some of the greats of the 20<sup>th</sup> century such as Hindemith, Prokofiev and Martinů. He wasn't part of the avant-garde per se, but he made full use of the possibilities emerging from a looser tonality. His legacy lies mainly in symphonic and concerto music—he often wrote for his wife, the harpsichordist Zuzana Růžičková. Modest Mussorgsky is an important representative of the Mighty Handful - five composers who attempted to promote an authentic Russian style of music. In his music Mussorgsky focused on very realistic, almost naturalistic areas and subjects. The Songs and Dances of Death are a song cycle based on Kutuzov's poems. The sombre character of the work corresponds to the theme of each song: in each of them the figure of Death appears at a different time and context. The soloist of the cycle is Olesya Petrova, a Russian mezzo-soprano who made her debut at the Bolshoi Theatre in 2018. The gloomy character of the songs will be offset by the optimistic Symphony No. 3 in E-flat major "Rhenish". The Romantic composer Robert Schumann wrote it during a blissful period spent with his wife Clara. Incidentally, the best friend of the couple was none other than Johannes Brahms: the trio perhaps therefore form the most famous love triangle in the history of music.

It has long been the destination of countless musicians searching for a successful career or a good education. This city is the link between the three composers whose music you will hear at this concert-even though only one, Anton Webern, was born in Vienna. The oldest of the three, Ludwig van Beethoven, was part of the First Viennese School and his music marks the end of the Classical era. The programme includes his Symphony No. 5 in C minor "Fate", arguably the composer's most famous work. Johannes Brahms, originally from Hamburg, wrote music in the style of the Romantics, albeit drawing greatly from Viennese Classical music. His affinity with this period can be seen in his Variations on a Theme by Haydn, Op. 56, which thanks to its choice of theme is a work filled with classical nobility and elegance. The music of Anton Webern takes us to an entirely different world. As a member of the Second Viennese School and follower of Arnold Schoenberg, his music abandons tonal certainties and searches for new ways to organize tonal material, which are to be found mainly in serialism. Symphony Op. 21 is a unique example of Webern's punctilious approach, attention to detail and ability to convey a concentrated message using very modest means. Domingo Hindoyan, the Chief Conductor of the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, will guide us through three centuries of music in Vienna.

While Rachmaninoff left his homeland for good after the revolution in 1917, Shostakovich spent his whole life in Russia (the Soviet Union). There were also differences in the two composers' musical outlooks. Rachmaninoff is described as the last Romantic; Shostakovich's musical language drew from tradition, but he also embellished it with 20th-century novelties. Rachmaninoff never fully adapted to life in exile, despite being an internationally recognised planist. Shostakovich had to cope with much graver problems. He was continually under surveillance and criticized by the Stalinist regime, in particular for his more progressive compositions, which were accused of formalism and even alienation from the reality of the socialist period. Paradoxically, this criticism was also levelled at his Symphony No. 9 in E-flat major, which Shostakovich wrote to celebrate the end of the Second World War. It is a work filled with joy, levity and a number of interesting, often long solos. We will hear Rachmaninoff's one-movement Youth Symphony in D minor and his crowning achievement, the monumental Concerto for Piano and Orchestra No. 3 in D minor. The soloist will be the Macedonian pianist Simon Trpčeski, whose recording of Rachmaninoff's music was awarded the prestigious Diapason d'Or.

The composers shared similar toutlooks and often sought inspiration from the great works of the Classical era. Mendelssohn was also interested in his predecessors' music from the perspective of an organizer. He was directly responsible for the re-introduction of Bach's St Matthew Passion and the renewed interest in the music of Mozart. His own musical language was very much part of early Romanticism. However, he was unable to fulfil his incredible potential: he died aged only 38. He did, though, manage to write five outstanding symphonies, including Symphony No. 3 in A minor "Scottish". The composer was fascinated by England and Scotland, visiting the landscapes there several times. His symphonies reflect the atmosphere of specific places rather than the melodies of the local folk music. The Concerto for Piano and Orchestra No. 2 in B major is one of Brahms's two piano concertos. Within the context of the genre it is a particularly large work (due to its unusual four-movement layout it stretches to nearly fifty minutes) and was premiered by Brahms himself. At our concert you will hear it played by the world-famous pianist Garrick Ohlsson, a winner of the International Chopin Piano Competition and a Grammy Award.

Beethoven's Coriolan Overture provides us with a fitting opening to the evening. It relates the story of the Roman general Gaius Martius Coriolanus, who may or may not have been a real figure. The military theme also determines the character of the composition: Beethoven's music is particularly rousing - almost brusque in places. We then turn back a few decades earlier to Mozart's Concerto for Violin and Orchestra No. 5 in A major "Turkish". Mozart wrote his violin concertos in relatively guick succession in Salzburg in the 1770s. The character of the concerto is bound in particular to the last movement, where Mozart works mainly with Turkish rhythmical elements. These were very popular at the time, as is demonstrated by Mozart's notorious Rondo all Turca. The solo part of the concerto will be performed by the violinist Grace Park, who made her debut at the Carnegie Hall at the end of 2021. We will conclude with music from the 20th century and Kurt Weill's rhythmically concise Symphony No. 2. As a result of his background, the composer of the famous Threepenny Opera became a target of Nazi repression. Weill, however, was able to emigrate, and in the USA he tried to put behind him how he had lived and worked in his native Germany.

This was written at roughly the same time as another of Brahms's concerto overtures, the Academic Festival Overture. These two contrasting pieces were premiered on the same evening and so the word "tragic" was inserted primarily to distinguish these two compositions. The work is indeed very dramatic though it is not related to any tragic story or event. The end of the season will then be seen out with Brahms's last symphony, Symphony No. 4 in E minor, Op. 98. Brahms needed only four works in this genre to earn the reputation as a great symphonist: and his Fourth Symphony shows us exactly why. It is proof that Brahms was a master of form who was capable of constructing a coherent, organic whole. In his last symphony he holds the listener's attention from the expansive, ardent introduction to the opulent harmonies at the end. These two opuses by Brahms are interspersed with Carl Reinecke's Concerto for Harp and Orchestra in E minor. This acclaimed German composer, conductor and pianist was the teacher of Max Bruch, Edvard Grieg and Leoš Janáček. During his time as Chief Conductor at the Leipzig Gewandhaus he premiered works such as the final version of Brahms's German Requiem. We will hear Reinecke's Concerto for Harp and Orchestra in E minor performed by one of today's most renowned harpists, Emmanuel Ceysson.



The first evening of the Lobkowicz subscription series will be dedicated to the music of the most ingenious composers ever: we shall hear compositions by Felix Mendelssohn, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and Johann Sebastian Bach. It is fascinating how young Mendelssohn and Mozart were when they wrote the works which will be performed at this concert. Mendelssohn composed his Concerto for Violin and Strings in D minor when he was only 13. However, the concerto then slipped into obscurity and only came back into the public eye in the 1950s thanks to the violin virtuoso Yehudi Menuhin. The youthfully energetic Divertimento in F major, K. 138 was one of the divertimentos written by a 16-year-old Mozart during his successful tour of Italy. Johann Sebastian Bach's Concerto for Two Violins and Strings, BWV 1043, is further proof of the composer's unrivalled mastery, which continues to inspire composers of classical music to this day. This evening's soloist is the South Korean violinist Bomsori Kim, an award-winning young musician who signed an exclusive contract with Deutsche Grammophon in 2021.

The focus of the programme for the second of this year's concerts at the Lobkowicz Palace is on works from the Classical period — an era which our orchestra feels a great affinity with. The evening opens with the overture to Mozart's opera Così fan tutte, filled with sparkling virtuoso sections. We will then continue with Christoph Willibald Gluck's extremely elegant Concerto for Flute and Orchestra in G major. Gluck was famous mainly as an opera composer and he was one of the most important reformers of this genre. His Concerto for Flute, which offers soloists beautiful vocal lines as well as sections requiring bravura, has become increasingly popular among flautists today. The concerto will be performed by the first flautist of the PKF - Prague Philharmonia, Jiří Ševčík. The Classical trio is completed by Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 1 in C major: a cheerful work where the influence of Mozart and Haydn is combined with the already pervasive elements of Beethoven's later language. A contrast for the evening comes from a composition by Michael Fine, a Grammy Award winner for classical music production. Fine wrote the unsettling composition A Time of Uncertainties at an airport when he was waiting to return to Europe from the USA to visit his sick wife.

The third concert of the Lobkowicz subscription series is dedicated to vocal-instrumental music. The PKF - Prague Philharmonia will be sharing the podium with an outstanding musician from the upcoming generation of artists, the baritone Konstantin Krimmel, a member of the Bavarian State Opera. The concert programme will be exclusively Classical, featuring works by Joseph Haydn and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. While Mozart's operas are an essential part of theatre repertoires across the globe, Joseph Haydn's operas are given more sporadically. However, this brilliant composer wrote works for the stage from his residence at Esterházy Castle, and one of the most beautiful is the opera L'anima del filosofo, ossia Orfeo ed Euridice. We will hear numbers from Mozart's famous comic operas The Marriage of Figaro and Così fan tutte, as well as from one of his last operas, the fairy-tale Magic Flute, where humorous scenes appear alongside a number of philosophical thoughts. The purely instrumental works consist of Mozart's Symphony No. 23 in D major, a remarkable work by an 18-year-old genius, and his Contredanses, which were probably written for the carnival season in the last year of Mozart's life. However, the composer based them on earlier works, for example, on famous melodies from The Marriage of Figaro.

The Adagio for Strings by the American conductor Samuel Barber became one of the most popular pieces of 20th-century classical music. Another composition purely for strings for this evening will be Petr Ilyich Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings. The four-movement composition was written in 1880. In the first part, Pezzo in forma di Sonata, Tchaikovsky refers to the music of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, who he admired unreservedly. Primarily, however, the Serenade is proof of Tchaikovsky's melodic mastery and shows him as a composer working along the lines of European Romanticism. Alongside these works for strings, the programme also offers a selection from Felix Mendelssohn's Songs Without Words. He himself invited the idea of songs without words and went on to write nearly four dozen of them for the piano. He composed some of the earliest for his sister, Fanny Mendelssohn, while one of the later volumes was dedicated to Clara Schumann. Here we will hear a selection of songs arranged for strings and clarinet: the solo part will be performed by the first clarinettist of the Berlin Philharmonic, Andreas Ottensamer.

The Chamber Music Series is a concert showcase for the chamber ensembles and players of the PKF—Prague Philharmonia. For the 2022–2023 season we will once again return to the Baroque refectory of the Professed House of the Faculty of Mathematics and Physics of Charles University (MFF UK) at Malostranské náměstí (Lesser Town Square) in Prague, regularly on a Monday from 7.30 pm.

The theme of the 29<sup>th</sup> chamber series is **Duos**. We want to highlight the strength and importance of individual musical instruments in classical music. 





# ORCHESTRAL ACADEMY



PARTNER OF THE ORCHESTRAL ACADEMY

The PKF — Prague Philharmonia Orchestral Academy was established in 2008 as the first project of this type in the Czech Republic. Each year, the orchestra welcomes 12 to 14 young, talented musicians to its family. PKF players help them to gain practice in high quality orchestral playing, and enthusiastically they teach them the basic philosophy of PKF's style of performance: precision, a sense of harmony and attention to detail, artistic humility, friendship and respect.

From the very beginning, the members of the Orchestral Academy have been involved in PKF's artistic projects. They play at **concerts not only in the Czech Republic, but also abroad**, have the opportunity to appear in PKF's chamber music series and participate in **recording projects**.

The first year of the Orchestral Academy met with great interest, and a year later, in 2009, several of its members took part in the unique **YouTube Symphony Orchestra** project. Two of them — **Jakub Fišer** and **Ondřej Martinovský** — performed under the direction of conductor **M. Tilson Thomas** together with 90 selected musicians from all over the world at Carnegie Hall in New York.



"The journey into the Baroque, to the Middle Ages and the mind of Comenius — that was a unique experience. It was so surprising and revelatory for me in many ways. 
