Let me especially thank all of you who support our orchestra in any way. The Prague Philharmonia is the only professional orchestra in the Czech Republic whose founder is not a state, city or region. It is for this reason that we depend on your financial support to help us take this exceptional orchestra to the absolute top of the world in performing music of the High Classical period, the core repertoire of our orchestra.

For our upcoming 31st season I wish you a wonderful time with the Prague Philharmonia, an orchestra that breathes and shines.

The Prague Philharmonia enjoys a unique position among Prague's professional orchestras, no matter how difficult her existence and daily struggle with the current economic reality. I hear nothing but praise for her from all quarters, both from her fellow professionals and from experienced listeners, and her star in the metropolitan musical sky is not fading. She is a sprightly 30-something, and at this age she already has her sense of pride, so she is well aware that the road to success does not lead through dramaturgical populism, chasing listeners by rehashing the popular, tried-and-tested musical pieces without which renown cannot be achieved. Rather, it is just the opposite: the orchestra does not relent in its efforts to provide new inspirations for its programming which have the potential to appeal not just to inquisitive youth, but also to keep demanding, experienced, loyal listeners in a positive state of tension. Not every orchestra can afford to devote an entire subscription series to contemporary

music, not every ensemble can boast a whole bunch of imaginative innovations while giving voice in her chamber series to some very unusual instruments (bass clarinet, viola d'amore, marimba, tuba and others).

My wish for my favorite Prague Philharmonia is that she will retain the inimitable, youthful spark with which she bravely entered the stagnant waters of the Czech orchestral pond 30 years ago, that she will continue to have a lucky hand in inviting interesting soloists, and that she will continue to rely on her obvious, proven taste for music-making, a value that we, the listeners, can intuitively recognize and which will attract us, as it has in the long line of past seasons, wherever we see that mark of exceptional artistic quality on a poster or in the media – the logo of the Prague Philharmonia.

The Prague Philharmonia

In 1994, the world-famous conductor Jiří Bělohlávek, together with a group of talented young musicians, founded the Prague Chamber Philharmonic Orchestra. Its successes abroad and its expanding repertoire led the orchestra first to change its name to the PKF – Prague Philharmonia, and now, in the 2024/2025 season, the orchestra is presenting itself as the Prague Philharmonia.

Over the last 30 years, the orchestra has gained respect throughout the music world for its characteristic sound as well as for the focus of its repertoire - music by Joseph Haydn, W. A. Mozart and Ludwig van Beethoven. Its core repertoire also includes music by Antonín Dvořák, Bedřich Smetana and their successors, as well as French and German composers ranging from Robert Schumann to Johannes Brahms and Maurice Ravel. 20th century compositions and new contemporary works are an integral part of its repertoire. The Prague Philharmonia retains its chamber character as well as its passionate commitment and attention to detail, although today it falls between a chamber ensemble and a small symphony orchestra in terms of its size.

Since its founding, the orchestra has been led by a number of renowned chief conductors, each of whom has contributed in his own way to the development of the Prague Philharmonia's distinctive sound. After Jiří Bělohlávek, Kaspar Zehnder took over the role of chief conductor in 2005, followed by Jakub Hrůša in 2008. Since the beginning of the 2015/2016 season the orchestra has been led by the French conductor Emmanuel Villaume. The Prague Philharmonia has also performed with internationally famous soloists including Julian Rachlin, Martha Argerich, Jefim Bronfman, András Schiff, Gil Shaham, Isabelle Faust, Emmanuel Pahud, Luciano Pavarotti, Diana Damrau, Anna Netrebko, Plácido Domingo, Gautier Capuçon, Maxim Vengerov, Mischa Maisky, Juan Diego Flórez, Jonas Kaufmann and

many others. The orchestra is regularly invited to international music festivals (BBC Proms, Dresdner Musikfestspiele, MITO Settembre Musica, Prague Spring, Festspielhaus Baden-Baden) and gives concerts at top world venues (Berliner Philharmonie, Elbphilharmonie Hamburg, Gasteig Munich, Tokyo Suntory Hall, Royal Opera House Muscat in Oman, Sheikh Jaber Al-Ahmad Cultural Centre in Kuwait, Festspiel Baden-Baden, Seoul Arts Center, Musikverein and Théâtre Champs-Elysées, among others).

The discography of this ensemble includes more than 90 compact discs for prestigious international and Czech music labels (Deutsche Grammophon, Warner Classics, Sony Classical, Decca, EMI, Harmonia Mundi and Supraphon). Its recordings have garnered numerous prizes: the Gold Record RAC Canada in 2000, the Harmonie Award in 2001 and the Diapason d'Or in 2007. Its CD Héroïque with Bryan Hymel was nominated for the International Opera Award in 2016, and its CD Bohemian Rhapsody with Gábor Boldoczki was nominated for the International Classical Music Award (ICMA) in 2017. Its Ravel, Debussy & Bizet CD received excellent reviews from the London Sunday Times, Gramophone and the BBC Music Magazine, which included it in its top 10 recordings of the week; its CD with the acclaimed tenor Benjamin Bernheim for Deutsche Grammophon from November 2019 won the Opus Klassik Award and numerous accolades in the international press (the Diapason d'Or and Choc de Classica, among others).

The orchestra has recently toured Japan, Germany, Italy, Turkey, France and Taiwan, and has performed at the Musikverein in Vienna. In 2023, it made a successful recording for Deutsche Grammophon with the tenor Jonathan Tetelman as well as a recording of Penderecki's compositions with the flutist Stathis Karapanos (Warner Classics).

The Music Director and Chief Conductor of the Prague Philharmonia, Emmanuel Villaume, continues his tenure this season also as the Music Director of The Dallas Opera.

A frequent collaborator with major international opera houses, Villaume leads performances at The Metropolitan Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Washington National Opera, San Francisco Opera, Los Angeles Opera, Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, Santa Fe Opera, Royal Opera House Covent Garden, Liceu Barcelona, Montreal Opera, Teatro Colón, Opéra de Paris, Théâtre du Capitole de Toulouse, Bayerische Staatsoper, Deutsche Oper Berlin, Hamburgische Staatsoper, Cologne Opera, Teatro La Fenice, Teatro Regio di Torino and Teatro Real Madrid.

Also leading a distinguished career on the international symphonic platform, Villaume collaborates with esteemed ensembles such as Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra, San Francisco Symphony, Boston Symphony Orchestra, Montreal Symphony Orchestra, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, Orchestre de Paris, Danish National Symphony Orchestra, Münchner Rundfunkorchester, Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Melbourne Symphony Orchestra and NHK Tokyo.

Villaume studied at the Conservatoire de Strasbourg and at Sorbonne University in Paris (literature, philosophy, music) and holds an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Indianapolis.



Orchestral Series A

The Prague Philharmonia is entering its fourth decade. It does so with an enthusiasm all its own, with new inspiration, a new name and a new visual style. The new season of Orchestral Series A, traditionally based in Prague's Rudolfinum, has once again been designed and prepared by the orchestra's Music Director and Chief Conductor Emmanuel Villaume, who will personally conduct five of the nine scheduled concerts.

Our invitation to conduct the rest of the program has been accepted by Louis Langrée, head of the Opéra Comique of Paris, as well as by the emerging, stellar conductors Gemma New, Angus Webster and Łukasz Borowicz. Soloists to look forward to include the Wagner opera star Nicholas Brownlee, the energetic cellist István Várdai, the Greek flutist Stathis Karapanos and the pianists Barry Douglas and Hyuk Lee. The "home court" will be defended by the violinist Josef Špaček, the jazz trombonist Štěpán Janoušek and Prague Philharmonia concertmaster Romana Špačková.

On the one hand, the programming of the Rudolfinum concerts honors the orchestra's roots and the basic building blocks of its repertoire laid down by Villaume's predecessors, starting with the orchestra's founder Jiří Bělohlávek, while on the other hand it opens up new horizons.

The season will therefore see the orchestra perform Ludwig van Beethoven's most influential Symphonies Nos. 3 and 7 and Vítězslav Novák's Slovak Suite; the culmination of the Year of Czech Music 2024 will be celebrated with Bedřich Smetana, Antonín Dvořák and Karel Husa. However, there will also be world and Czech premieres, such as a new composition commissioned from Petr Wajsar and the first Prague performance of Huw Watkins's Dawning, and we will discover the legacy of Louise Farrenc, a French composer from the early 19th century. The season's program also includes sophisticated works by Viennese Classical composers, Romantic symphonies by Brahms, Schumann and Dvořák requiring larger orchestral scoring, and music by Penderecki, Martinů and Shostakovich which is more progressive and modern in spirit.


The Prague Philharmonia opens the 2024/2025 season in the final phase of the Year of Czech Music. Who would be more suitable for the opening ceremony than Bedřich Smetana? From the works of this great composer we have selected the overture to his masterpiece -The Secret. In this opera, Smetana draws from Shakespeare and transforms the theme of forbidden love into a comedy. Another composition having its precursor in literature is the symphonic poem The Golden Spinning Wheel, through which Antonín Dvořák paid tribute to the greatest Czech Romantic poet, Karel Jaromír Erben. The Golden Spinning Wheel belongs to four symphonic poems that Dvořák wrote towards the end of his life in Vysoká u Příbrami and is justly considered one of the jewels of Czech music.

In addition to Smetana and Dvořák, Vítězslav Novák will also be heard at the start of the season.

His Slovak Suite takes us to Moravia and reveals the composer's fascination with folk melodies and the continuity of his style with that of his teacher, Antonín Dvořák. The opening program also features Karel Husa, Pulitzer Prize winner and prominent composer in the United States, where he emigrated in the 1950s after his studies in Paris. His works were therefore not performed in Czechoslovakia during the totalitarian regime. Our orchestra, however, has continuously devoted itself to them and, for example, in 2018 performed his legendary Music for Prague 1968 in Orchestral Series A. Tonight we will hear Serenade for Wind Quintet, Strings, Xylophone and Harp, in which the solo parts will be played by the popular, award-winning Belfiato Quintet, whose players grew up artistically at our Orchestral Academy, later became members of the Prague Philharmonia, and still regularly collaborate with our orchestra.

Beethoven's Symphony No. 3 "Eroica" is undoubtedly one of the biggest attractions to concert halls all over the world. The Prague Philharmonia has had it in its repertoire almost since our inception, and our players still especially remember our detailed, deeply immersive performances with the orchestra's founder, Jiří Bělohlávek. This time Louis Langrée, Music Director of the Opéra Comique of Paris, will guide us through its twists and turns as well as its message. Langrée became famous, among other things, for his American project "Beethoven Revolution", in which he tried to show audiences how this composer changed the course of music history. Beethoven launched this revolution with his Eroica, which opened the door to the Romantic musical language.

However, the orchestra will open our German-Austrian evening with Mozart's overture to the opera La clemenza di Tito, which still resonates in Prague; it was premiered at the Estates Theater on the occasion of the coronation of Leopold II as King of Bohemia. In contrast, the iconic work Metamorphosen by the late Romantic German composer Richard Strauss will also be heard, allowing the string section of the orchestra to shine. In this piece, the composer reflects on the state of a bombed-out Europe in the final weeks of the Second World War, quoting the funeral march from the second movement of Beethoven's Eroica at the end of the last movement, to which he has added the words "In memoriam".

The third evening will start in a very progressive spirit with the world premiere of a new composition for orchestra and solo trombone. Petr Wajsar, a contemporary Czech composer loved by performers and audiences alike, will present his legendary sense of humor and compositional skills. In addition to its wit and theatrical elements, his work is characterized by a crossover between many genres of classical and non-classical music. He regularly collaborates with the members of the Prague Philharmonia, especially in Contemporary Music Series S. He has had many successful premieres in the field of artificial music and is also the winner of the Czech Lion film award for his music for the film Hastrman. The solo part in this world premiere will be performed by the jazz trombonist Štěpán Janoušek. The second soloist of the evening, the young but well-known pianist Hyuk Lee, who won the prestigious international Long-Thibaud competition, will take us into the calmer waters of 19th century music. He will perform Mendelssohn's Piano Concerto No. 1, which its composer, at the early age of 22, wrote in record time.

The Prague Philharmonia will close the Year of Czech Music 2024 with Antonín Dvořák's Symphony No. 6. This composition occupies a specific place in Dvořák's oeuvre. It is his first published symphony and one of the first symphonic works that earned him an international reputation. In this symphony, the composer developed his compositional language based on Brahms and Beethoven. After all, the commission came from Vienna, where Beethoven's music was still very popular. Eventually, however, the work was premiered in Prague in 1881.

Last season, the Greek flutist Stathis Karapanos recorded an album with the Prague Philharmonia for the prestigious Warner Classics label. It features the complete repertoire for flute and orchestra by Krzysztof Penderecki, a leading figure of Polish music in recent decades. Karapanos will perform one of these works, Sinfonietta for Flute and String Orchestra, on the fourth evening of Orchestral Series A under the direction of Polish conductor Łukasz Borowicz. Together they will also present Mozart's Flute Concerto No. 2 in D major.

The first concert of 2025 will also present dance music of different styles. The 18th century will be represented by ballets from Mozart's Idomeneo and Gluck's Don Juan, compositions that, although separated by 20 years, are united by the same inspiration from the strong French dance tradition. In fact, Gluck wrote his Don Juan specifically for Paris, and Mozart drew on experiences gained during his time in Paris to compose the ballet music for Idomeneo. The third ballet of the evening, Échec au Roi, also relates to the city on the Seine. Its composer, Bohuslav Martinů, is intrinsically linked to the French metropolis, and it was there in the 1930s, when composing his three ballets, that he developed his distinctive compositional language, into which he also introduced elements of jazz.

The fifth concert of the season is full of female energy. Our orchestra's invitation has been accepted by conductor Gemma New, the star from New Zealand who will conduct the Czech premiere of Overture No. 2 by the 19th century French composer Louise Farrenc. Louise Farrenc was a special phenomenon given her social status and the limited rights of women at the time. Not only did she manage to study composition in addition to piano (privately with Antonín Rejcha), but she even took her music, which includes a number of chamber pieces, as well as three symphonies, to the international concert stage.

The solo part of Johannes Brahms's Violin Concerto will be brought to life thanks to the virtuosity of world-renowned violinist Josef Špaček, a finalist in the Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels, among other achievements. Brahms originally wrote this masterpiece for one of the greatest violinists of all time, Joseph Joachim.

Our excursion into the musical language of the 19th and early 20th centuries will conclude with the late Romantic Finnish composer Jean Sibelius. Symphony No. 5, which was premiered in Helsinki on the composer's 50th birthday and was an incredible success, is especially famous for its finale. The so-called "swan theme", which arose from his observation of the flight of 16 swans, has become legendary. The composer described it in his diary as "one of the greatest experiences of my life".

We will welcome two international stars to our sixth orchestral evening – the conductor Angus Webster and the cellist István Vardai. Dawning, commissioned by the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra in 2020 from the contemporary British composer Huw Watkins, will be one of the other Czech premieres this season. The world premiere took place a few years ago with the conductor and pianist Angus Webster, who was so enchanted by Watkins's academically polished yet very agreeable music that he has included it in the program of his Prague debut.

However, the evening will continue in the modernist spirit thanks to Dmitri Shostakovich's First Cello Concerto, one of the most demanding, most performed works of the concert literature. The solo part, originally written for the famous virtuoso Mstislav Rostropovich, will be played by the Hungarian cellist István Várdai, first prize winner of the prestigious ARD competition in Munich and current Artistic Director of the Franz Liszt Chamber Orchestra.

The evening's program will conclude with Robert Schumann's technically demanding Symphony No. 2, which is "full of sunshine", according to the conductor Angus Webster, who admits to having a strong affection for this work. Schumann managed to complete this symphony before he was caught up in a year of mourning during which he lost his friends Fanny and Felix Mendelssohn as well as his 16-month-old son. It was Mendelssohn who took up the baton for the premiere of this symphony in 1846.

In the last season the Prague Philharmonia celebrated great success with Cherubini's Requiem No. 1 in C minor. The orchestral evening in March will offer another piece of the composer's oeuvre, namely that made him famous in Paris at the beginning of the 19th century. The opera Les Abencérages was very popular in its time and its premiere was attended by Napoleon himself. After Napoleon's fall, however, Cherubini's music fell into near oblivion and is only now beginning to enjoy a new wave of interest.

The last completed piano concerto by Ludwig van Beethoven, written during the siege of Vienna, is also closely linked to Napoleon's campaigns. While Cherubini was benefiting from Napoleon's favor in Paris, Beethoven was hiding in his brother's cellar with pillows over his ears

to preserve what remained of his hearing from the siege's deafening explosions. The solo part will be played by a lover of Beethoven's music, the Irish pianist Barry Douglas, who in addition to his international performing career is also Artistic Director of Camerata Ireland and the Clandeboye Festival.

The seventh evening of Orchestral Series A will be conducted by Prague Philharmonia's Music Director and Chief Conductor Emmanuel Villaume, for whom the concert is also an opportunity to continue his long-term project of presenting symphonic works by Johannes Brahms. In connection with Beethoven's Piano Concerto, Brahms's Symphony No. 3, which Hans Richter, its first conductor, called "Brahms's Eroica", comes directly to mind.

The penultimate concert of the season will take us to the German-language vocal music of the 19th century. The hall of Prague's Rudolfinum will first be filled with Weber's overture to his most famous opera, Der Freischütz. It is considered the first German Romantic opera in history and the cornerstone of Romantic music in general. Then, under the baton of Emmanuel Villaume, a very special guest will appear, the American bass-baritone Nicholas Brownlee, who has recently become acclaimed mainly for the role of Wagner's Wotan. On the eighth evening, the soloist together with the orchestra will present the beauty of Mahler's Lieder to listeners in a performance of selected songs from the extensive collection Des Knaben Wunderhorn, justly considered one of the gems of song literature. Gustav Mahler was not only a great composer, but also an excellent conductor. He gained recognition in this field especially through his precise staging of Wagner's operas.

It is logical, therefore, to end this evening with Richard Wagner's Symphony in C major. It was Wagner's only completed symphony, premiered in Prague in 1832, and imbued with strong Beethovenian inspiration. Wagner wrote it just a few years after the death of the legendary figure of music history. In addition to following Beethoven, Wagner also followed the orchestration principles of the great early Romantic opera composer Carl Maria von Weber.

The 2024/2025 season season will conclude with the orchestra's Music Director and Chief Conductor Emmanuel Villaume, as is traditional. He has offered the honorary place of soloist for the evening to the excellent violinist and longtime concertmaster of the Prague Philharmonia, Romana Špačková. The prelude to their collaboration will first be Anton Webern's Passacaglia, a piece from his early period with strong Romantic influences and a taste for experimentation. The epic arch of this work, inspired by Baroque variations, evokes the atmosphere of the dramatic period of the early 20th century, in which we will fully immerse ourselves thanks to Dmitri Shostakovich's Violin Concerto No. 1 in A minor. The post-war period when the concerto was written marked another artistically turbulent phase of the composer's life, when he had to face great criticism of his work and was politically persecuted.

The Violin Concerto therefore did not receive its premiere until 1959, when the situation calmed down thanks to Shostakovich's forced promotion of the USSR on the international stage.

The evening will culminate with the performance of one of Ludwig van Beethoven's most important compositions – Symphony No. 7.

This work, which the composer sketched during his spa stay in Teplice in Bohemia, is sometimes called the "apotheosis of dance" and is one of the most performed of Beethoven's symphonies together with Eroica and Symphony No. 5 "Fate". In addition to Eroica, the Seventh Symphony has been part of the Prague Philharmonia's DNA from the very beginning. Perfect knowledge of and a strong relationship with this score enables the players to convincingly offer the audience innovative interpretative concepts of it.

We will hear works which are hardly ever played (Adagio and Fugue in G minor by František Xaver Richter), as well as some very well-known pieces ("Air" from Suite No. 3 in D major) in unique interpretations by the Azerbaijani cellist Jamal Aliyev. "I cherish every moment with these musicians, and our energy and passion for music have only grown deeper," says Emmanuel Villaume, the orchestra's Music Director and Chief Conductor. He is also continuing to serve as Music Director of the Dallas Opera and is working with the world's leading opera houses, while his career as a symphony music conductor on the international scene is equally significant. Villaume will conduct the second concert of the Lobkowicz subscription series, traditionally held in June, for which he has chosen works by Joseph Haydn, Maurice Ravel and Bohuslav Martinů. The program of this concert is based on contrasts. Martinů's playful, colorful, rhythmically sparkling music promises a beautiful, upbeat opening to the June concert. The archives of the Prague Conservatory reveal their treasures – this could be the description of our opening Concerto for Two Bassoons by Václav Neukirchner, first bassoonist of the Royal Opera House in Stuttgart who in his day was a renowned performer and composer. His concerto, together with his many other pieces of music for bassoon, is still waiting for its new, contemporary premiere. The two soloists in this work will be the Prague Philharmonia's bassoonist Tomáš Františ and the stellar bassoonist Sophie Dervaux, who despite her young age is a fully established performer on the international scene. BBC Music Magazine wrote: "There is much to enjoy in Dervaux's playing: Her cadenzas are short but inventive,

her rapid ornamentations technically perfect, and her cantabile sound has a generous warmth." In addition to her solo career, which has taken her to the world's leading concert halls, including London's Royal Albert Hall and New York's Carnegie Hall, she also collaborates with the most prestigious international orchestras: While in the past she was a contra bassoonist with the Berlin Philharmonic, she is currently principal bassoonist with the equally prestigious Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra and the Vienna State Opera Orchestra. In recent years she has also made a name for herself as a conductor. She will take up the baton as well as the bassoon at the Lobkowicz evening, where compositions by W. A. Mozart will be heard in addition to Neukirchner's music.

Georg Friedrich Händel and Joseph Haydn are two important continental composers of the 18th century who also had a significant influence on musical life in England. While Haydn spent just a few years in London, Händel remained there for two-thirds of his life and was instrumental in promoting Italian opera and the creation of English oratorio. Their vocal instrumental music, originally intended for castrati, will be performed by the mezzo-soprano Helen Charlston on this final Lobkowicz evening. Charlston is a recent recipient of the prestigious Gramophone Award for her album of 17th century arias and a winner of the BBC Music Magazine's 2023 Vocal Awards. She specializes in early music from Monteverdi to Mozart and has received invitations from a number of major world venues, including the Wigmore Hall and the Concertgebouw. She is also one of the first graduates of the "Rising Star" program organized by the renowned British period orchestra, the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment. Her successful career was secured in 2018 by winning the Händel Singing Competition in London and subsequently performing, for example, in Händel's operas, of which we will hear a selection, being guided tonight by her "warmly distinctive tone" (The Telegraph).

Chamber Music Series K

In the 31st season of the Prague Philharmonia, our Chamber Music Series is based on the theme of "the other instruments". We would like to highlight the importance of lesser-known and rarely used solo instruments. Chamber music belongs to the precious musical heritage of world culture, and it is the instruments themselves, including the "other" ones, which are of fundamental importance to performers achieving technical perfection. The audience of the Chamber Music Series can look forward to instruments such as the bass clarinet, contrabassoon, English horn, Baroque bassoon, Baroque oboe, viola d'amore, harp, tuba, marimba and guitar.

Our invitation to join the Chamber Music Series has been accepted not just by leading Czech musicians, but also by international figures. First we will mention clarinetist Anna Paulová (a laureate of the Prague Spring Competition and semi-finalist of the prestigious ARD competition in Munich) who, together with Trio Clavio, will perform as the bass clarinetist in the second concert on 14 October 2024. Ladislav Bilan, the leading marimba player (he has successfully participated in numerous competitions, including the World Championship of Performing Arts in Los Angeles), will perform on 18 November 2024 in works for a nontraditional combination of instruments (English horn, harp, piano and marimba). Ondřej Šindelář, who teaches the Baroque bassoon course at the Janáček Academy of Performing Arts in Brno, has accepted our invitation to the final concert on

9 June 2025, where he will play this very instrument. The Chamber Music Series will be opened on 23 September 2024 by the Fama Quartet together with the American pianist Bethany Danel Brooks and the renowned Spanish guitarist Alex Garrobé, professor of guitar and chamber music at the Catalan Music College and holder of a doctorate in art history and musicology. Chamber Music Series subscribers can also look forward to virtuoso performances of works by Czech and international composers. We will focus on great French composers whose anniversaries are celebrated in the 2024/2025 season, namely Gabriel Fauré (died 4 November 1924), Erik Satie (died 1 July 1925) and Maurice Ravel (born 1875).

Two concerts in this series have been designated as "special" - they are exceptional in their character and will be held in the Large Hall of the Svanda Theater, namely, the concert (S3) Petr Kotík and Philip Glass: 50 years in New York City and the congratulatory concert (S4) Vladimír Franz 65.

The final concert of the series (S6) is "extra special" – it will be held in Czech Radio's Studio S1 and will include a visualization of the music through lighting design. The concerts include a live debate with our invited guests. The concert performers are, as is traditional, members of the Prague Philharmonia and their special musical guests – the violinist and vocalist Gabriela Vermelho, the pianist Miroslav Beinhauer and the clarinetist Anna Paulová. These "Music Talk Shows" in the Contemporary Music Series are for those who want to travel far beyond the horizons of ordinary experience through exquisite music and the spoken word.







These two composers have been active in the musical avant-garde in New York City since the 1970s, a common point where they create, compose, and organize concerts and major artistic projects. What influenced them most in the early days of their musical involvement? Were they fundamentally shaped by their family background? Petr Kotik, who has been a longterm friend of Philip Glass, will guide you through an evening on the development of the musical avant-garde in New York City since the 1970s.

Our selection of compositions by Glass was consulted with his close associates - the pianist Michael Riesman (music director of the Philip Glass Ensemble and conductor of almost all of Glass's compositions) and Richard Guérin (director of

Orange Mountain Music, one of the record labels founded by Glass). Three pieces have been selected; two will be performed in their Czech premieres. The third piece, Two Pages from 1968, one of his most typical compositions from this period, will be presented by the internationally acclaimed pianist Miroslav Beinhauer, who has already performed this work several times.

The program will feature two compositions by Petr Kotík, both in their world premieres.

On the occasion of this concert, we will publish program notes featuring a unique conversation between the two composers about their student years, professional beginnings and inspirations, recorded in New York in 2014.

Vladimír Franz (1959) is an outstanding figure of the Czech cultural scene. He graduated from the Faculty of Law of Charles University, while simultaneously studying painting privately with Karel Souček and Andrej Bělocvětov, music composition with Vladimír Sommer and Miroslav Reichl, as well as art history and music history. As a painter he has had over 50 solo exhibitions at home and abroad, exhibiting on three continents. His musical output is particularly extensive. Since the 1980s, he has mainly been composing incidental music, for which he has received many awards, but he also writes classical music, film soundtracks and radio music. So far he has composed incidental music for more than 120 theater productions for the leading Czech theaters (the National Theater in Prague, the National Theater in Brno, the Vinohrady Theater in Prague, Zlín City Theater, the West Bohemian Theater in Cheb, etc.). Since 1991 he has been teaching (in the Theater Faculty of the Academy of Performing Arts, the Film Faculty of the Academy of Performing Arts, the Faculty of Fine Arts of the Brno University of Technology, etc.). In 2004 he was appointed professor. In 2012 he ran for the office of the President of the Czech Republic.

Franz is a six-time winner of the Alfred Radok Award (1998, 2000, 2002, 2005, 2006, 2007). He received the Award of Divadelní noviny (Theatrical News) in 2001 and the OSA Award (OSA - Collective Rights Management Society for Musical Works) in 2012.



Four world premieres in one evening are promised by this concert of two representatives of the contemporary school of composition in the Czech Republic and Slovakia. Kateřina Horká (1993) has composed more than 150 works of various forms and characters, from chamber music to jazz and symphonic works. She profiles herself as an arranger and composer for all genres. She has been a finalist in numerous competitions, including the Cory Brass Band Composition Prize (Cardiff, UK) and the River City Brass Composition Prize (Pittsburgh, USA). In 2023, she won the St. Christopher International Composition Competition in Vilnius (Lithuania).

Marián Lejava (1976) is a prominent Slovak conductor, composer, teacher, a two-time winner of the Radio Head Awards and winner of two Music Fund Awards. His compositions have been performed at many national and international festivals of contemporary music (ISCM World New Music Days: Zagreb 2005, Warsaw Autumn 2006, Košice 2013, Biennial of Music Zagreb 2015 and Tallin 2019). In 2006 and 2017 he released two CDs of his own music.

Marián Lejava has prepared two world premieres of his compositions for the Prague audience, while Kateřina Horká will present four compositions, two of which will also be given their world premieres.

The guest performer of the evening will be the leading Czech clarinetist Anna Paulová.



The character and program of this final concert of the Contemporary Music Series will differ completely from the previous concerts. Two guests, both renowned in their respective professions with a shared interest in contemporary music – especially in combining classical music with electroacoustic and electronic music – will sit side by side on the same stage.

Karel Havlíček (1974) is a Czech contemporary composer and sound designer living alternately in Los Angeles and Prague. He composes soundtracks for Czech and Hollywood films as well as for commercials and important Czech Television jingles (Události ČT and ČT Sport), combining electronic music with classical music. His long experience in sound engineering and music composition makes him one of the most sought-after composers and sound designers in Europe and the USA. In 2024, he was nominated in the Best Music category for the Czech Lion film award for his music for the film Bratři (Brothers).

Vadim Petrov (1957) is the son of a leading Czech composer and trained as a classical guitarist but has been anchored in other professions for most of his life – from music director at

Czechoslovak Television, to spokesman for the Václav Klaus administration, to a general manager of human resources. As an expert, he has worked in both political marketing and cyber security, in which he is still active today. He is the author of two books Muž, který nevrhá stín (The Man Who Casts No Shadow) and Načítání (Loading). After 2020, he returned to music, in which he is intensely interested, and focuses mainly on contemporary classical music with elements of electronics using computer programs.

The concert will feature selected works by Karel Havliček performed by various instrumental ensembles put together exclusively for this evening by members of the Prague Philharmonia. The second guest, Vadim Petrov, has been significantly involved in the preparation of the concept of this extra special evening and has accepted the challenge of composing a string quartet for this project which will be performed here in its world premiere.

Especially for this concert, the individual compositions will be prepared for production in Czech Radio's Studio 1, including a visualization of the music's soundscapes using lighting design.

Concerts for Children and Parents

Our popular concert series for children and parents at the Rudolfinum must not be missed during the 31st season of the Prague Philharmonia. Our successful creative team, consisting of the director Jiří Adámek Austerlitz, the music programmer Matěj Kroupa and the set designer Ivana Kanhäuserová, has prepared a new concept that draws the audience into the imaginative world of classical music using the format of a dream. It is a key program in the field of music education because it delivers a progressive form of professional development and education and increases the chances of finding a professional job for talented students.
